EXTRACTS FROM REGULATIONS TO GOVERN COMPETITIONS

- 1. All entries shall be made to the Secretary, either on line or on the printed forms supplied, on or **before Saturday 6**th **February 2016.** No late or un-named entries will be allowed. Title, Composer/Author and accurate timing of OWN CHOICE PIECES must be stated on Entry Form
- 2. In Classes in which entry fees are charged, **no** entry will be accepted unless accompanied by the entry fee.
- 3. It is a condition of the competitions that prize winners shall, if requested to do so by the Committee, perform their respective Test Pieces at the Festival Concert. **See notes on Platform Presentations.**
- 4. In all Junior Classes, an academic year is stipulated. A competitor must be within the academic year specified, at Saturday 22nd April 2016, but not necessarily attending school.
- 5. A competitor who has reached their 18th birthday before 21st April 2016 may elect to enter Adult Classes in the Festival. This will however preclude entry in any of the year's Junior Classes.
- 6. The order in which Competitors shall perform shall be decided by at random.
- 7. No competitor may appear twice in the same class except in Classes C1, S19, SG4, SG10.
- 8. In case there is only one Competitor in any class, such Competitor shall be entitled to compete and take a prize provided that the Adjudicator considers that the performance is of sufficient merit.
- 9. All protests must be made in writing to the Festival Secretary before the Adjudicator's awards are made.
- 10. The Adjudicator's decision as to merit will be final.
- 11. The winners of the trophies offered for annual competition are required to give the Secretary a receipt for their respective trophies and to enter into an undertaking to return such trophies to **Peter Norris Music, 54 Bucks Road, Douglas,** cleaned and in good condition, not later than the date specified in the Syllabus.
- 12. No Competitor is allowed to speak to an Adjudicator immediately before or during the competition. Communications for the Adjudicator must be made through the Secretary.

- 13. Where a time limit has been stated this will be strictly adhered to. Marks will be deducted if the time limit is exceeded.
- 14. Recording Equipment: the use of recorders, cameras, video, audio etc. is prohibited in the competitions rooms, because of copyright legal restrictions and to avoid disturbing competitors.

CHOIRS GENERALLY

- 15. (a) No member of a Choir will sing with any other Choir in classes C2, C3, C4.
 - (b) Choirs, to be eligible for Competitions, must be composed of bona fide members only.
 - (c) Bona fide members of competing Choirs must have been in their respective Choirs for at least three calendar months prior to the Festival.
 - (d) Any Choir wishing to withdraw from a Competition must communicate its intention of doing so to the Secretary at the earliest moment.

VOCAL AND SPEECH CLASSES (18 years and over)

16. First time entrants may choose whether to sing in the General Vocal or the Special Solo Classes. Once a competitor has sung in the Special Solo Class they are only permitted to revert to the General Vocal Solo if they have not sung in the Special Solo Class for at least 5 years.

GUIDE TO COMPETITIONS

- 1. All run-throughs with the Official Accompanist must be arranged by the Competitor. Any request received within two weeks of the Festival may be refused.
- 2. Vocal Test pieces MUST be sung in the stated Key and may be sung in the original language.
- 3. The Official Accompanist **MUST** be used in Classes JS1 to JS10, S1 to S7, S8, S9, S12, S14, S15 and S18. Official Accompanist is also available in Classes S10, S13 and S17.
- 4. Please note that Classes S10 and JS11 are for solo performers only.
- 5. If Competitors in the Instrumental Classes require the Official Accompanist, they are entitled to an official run-through.
- 6. Own Choice music must be submitted with the entry form <u>only</u> if the Official Accompanist is required. This music must be in the key and translation as will be used in the competition with the Class, Competitor's Name and Telephone Number clearly printed on each copy of music. On-line entrants should send their music to the Music Co-ordinator, M. Griffin, Kensington Lane, Douglas, IM1 3ES by the closing date for entries.
- 7. Please read and abide by the regulations governing Copyright and the circumstances where photocopies are permitted.
- 8. It is the competitor's responsibility to check that their entry conforms to all requirements.
- 9. Competitors who use words and music in Solo or Duet singing classes (except Class S8) will not be awarded a mark.

PLATFORM PRESENTATION

In singing classes no teacher will be allowed back stage or on stage unless accompanying a pupil at the piano. Cleveland Medal Finals Night is the high point of the Festival. It is a special occasion and the highlight of the week both for the audience and those taking part. Because of the nature of the evening all those appearing on the platform are asked to bear this in mind and dress appropriately i.e. evening dress. For all other classes, people appearing on the platform should be smartly dressed.

Where copyright still exists, the Music Publishers Association has a revised Code of Practice on copying copyright works, and the following concession is made for copying own choice pieces from volumes only for the Adjudicator. Other items must not be photocopied without the permission of the copyright holder in each case.

When an Own Choice work is selected from a publication containing several different works and which is not published separately, one copy may be made for the use of an adjudicator at a competition or festival provided that the competitor or participant has already purchased his/her own copy and that the copy made is retained and destroyed by the Administrator of the Competition or Festival immediately after the event.

This permission specifically does not apply to set works.

Competitors are advised that this permission applies only to copyright holders who are Members of The Music Publishers Association (listed at the back of the Code of Practice leaflet, obtainable from the Association at 103 Kingsway, London, WC2B 6QX). It is the competitor's own responsibility to ensure that they seek permission to copy direct from any copyright holder whose name does not appear in the MPA list.

Single copies of items may not be photocopied without the prior permission of the copyright holder.

The permission does not apply to making copies for the Accompanist, who must always be given a printed copy from which to work. Photocopies for the adjudicator must be totally legible, or they may be refused.

OWN CHOICE CLASSES

- (a) The Festival is under legal obligation to supply the Performing Rights Society with details of all items performed at the Festival, therefore, the following must be adhered to.
 - (i) Entries will **NOT** be accepted without full details including Titles, Composers, Key, Page number and duration of Piece being shown on the Entry Form.
 - (ii) No Competitor will be permitted to change the Piece after the Entry Form has been accepted.
- (b) Competitors may not choose a piece specified for other classes.
- (c) In classes S8, S9, S12, S14 and children's classes the music for the official accompanist must be included with the entry form or the entry **WILL NOT** be accepted.
- (d) In other classes where an official accompanist is requested the copy for the accompanist must be included with the entry form otherwise this service will not be available. Once the official

accompanist has been requested this decision cannot be changed. **Copies must be marked clearly with the name of the competitor plus class and page number.** See Copyright Rules.

- (e) For Music Classes. A copy of the piece for the Adjudicator must be made available at the time of the competition, clearly marked with the competitor's name, class and page number.
- (f) Operatic Solo. If sung in a foreign language a **short** 30-60 second précis of the piece may be given by the competitor or provided for the steward to read to the audience.
- (g) Speech and Drama Classes. See page 17 for additional information.
- (h) Dance Classes: See page 25 for additional information.
- (i) All competitors should note that pieces with inappropriate language and/or content must not be entered. Pieces must be suitable for family audiences.

DANCE CLASSES

Teachers, parents and guardians are asked to consider carefully the choice of costume and choreography used by the contestants, bearing in mind the age of the entrant and the sensibilities of the audience. Offensive presentation may lead to disqualification of the entrant(s) from further participation in the Festival.

Competitors should come prepared with a CD of their music clearly marked with their name, the Class they are entering and their school name. The disc must have nothing else on it. All discs must be handed in at the collection point next to the Royal Hall sound booth at least 30 minutes before the class starts. A second copy should be available in the event that the first does not work.

Dancers may not perform more than once in the same class.

Pointe work is not allowed for any entrant under 13 years of age.

When requested in advance the steward will announce the title of the dance and, when a story is obscure, a short synopsis not exceeding 30 words.

All pieces are own choices and must not exceed **1 minute 30 seconds**. Marks will be deducted for exceeding the time limit. See page 8 for Own Choice regulations.

Ballet should include adage and allegro. Costume intended for classical ballet may be worn and should be simple and without ornamentation so that every aspect of classical technique is clearly visible. §§

Dandara Trophy

Modern is an all-inclusive term applied to an ever-evolving performing art. It includes lyrical modern, jazz, stage, contemporary, hip-hop and all styles of modern theatre dance. Acrobatic, gymnastic and street dance are acceptable only when combined with strong dance technique.

Classical Ballet is the traditional dance technique used in Character, although any dance technique is acceptable.
